Turning a House into a Home with Piper

Tucked away at the end of the 2nd floor of Dorm 208 lies the estate of Piper Kruchoski. Adjacent to the staircase and dry closet, and opposite the lounge, Ms. Kruchoski is situated at an interesting nexus of dorm activity. It is fitting, then, that her unique location offers rare design opportunities - and ones she so deftly exploits. Let's dive in.

The first thing I noticed about the Kruchoski residence is its corridor-like entrance. The neighboring dry closet juts into the room, directly across from the bathroom, resulting in a T-shaped layout. In her own words, "It gives hotel room vibes where you go down that little hall."

Where others might see limitations with this configuration, Ms. Kruchoski recognizes its possibilities. For by arranging her wardrobes in an "L" shape against the wall shared with the dry closet, she creates a room within a room. She's outfitted the space with forest tapestries, draped vines, and an oversized armchair, dubbing it the "Nature Nook." I could almost hear birds chirping and feel rays of sunshine poking through the canopy above. What better way to forget the barren expanse outside than to escape to this deciduous oasis? "I can be a recluse!" she laughs, adding that the alcove's uses are endless: "I read, I write, I listen to music, I color sometimes...what little kid doesn't want a fort?"

Further in the room, a mosaic of pink images surrounds the sink. As this area "feels very sterile" in most rooms, she wanted hers to "have a pop of color." The pictures are perfectly positioned so no matter where you stand, they reflect in the mirror for double the impact. Utilizing the reflection creates an illusion of more depth, making the space feel larger than it is. Nothing short of brilliant!

The bed and surrounding tapestries provide an equally satisfying aesthetic experience. The bars of her bed frames face outwards, flush with the wardrobes of the "Nature Nook", furthering the feeling of distinct rooms. Although boxing in her bed might be a slight inconvenience, or "a veet yourself onto the bed situation," it's a small price to pay for the wide open space it creates. This expanse is perfect for yoga, watching movies, or even "coming home inebriated on Saturdays, pulling out the space heater, and just laying here and falling asleep."

The minimalist yet elegant decorations over her bed - tapestries of a sunrise and a White Claw wearing a cowboy hat - were hand-picked to match the bed décor. She explains that "the color scheme kind of came together itself. You're distributed these lovely brown comforters," which are complemented nicely by the tapestries' subdued earthy tones.

It should be noted that a similar "Yee Claw!" tapestry was last spotted on the ceiling of Michael Reinhardt's* old room, located next door. That tapestry went missing around the time Piper acquired hers. Asked how she obtained her tapestry, Kruchoski responded, "I don't recall, but I think home invasion is a real problem here. Lock your doors or else things get taken!" Regardless of its origins, there can be no denying the tapestry is in its rightful home at the Kruchoski property.


